## Daily Devotional - Philippians Study

Week 1 - Day 1

**Proverbs 2:1-6** - **1** My son, if you accept my words and store up my commands within you, **2** turning your ear to wisdom and applying your heart to understanding— **3** indeed, if you call out for insight and cry aloud for understanding, **4** and if you look for it as for silver and search for it as for hidden treasure, **5** then you will understand the fear of the LORD and find the knowledge of God. **6** For the LORD gives wisdom; from his mouth come knowledge and understanding.

**Start with prayer:** “Father, this word from Proverbs reminds me that if I am to gain wisdom from your word, it’s up to you. Help me to do well the few things I can do, which is to come with an attitude of submission, and dependence, and an eagerness to dig in. Amen.”

### Setting up Today’s Passage - Acts 16:1-40

Today and tomorrow we will be reading two passages from the book of Acts which give us the back story of how the church in Philippi got started on Paul’s second missionary journey between 49-51 AD. The story is nothing short of remarkable! Note (vs. 6-8) how if Paul’s original plans for the journey had gone as he sought out, he would’ve ended up in Asia, in the region called Bithynia. But instead, the Holy Spirit directed him west towards Europe. As you read, think about the people who journeyed with Paul, and the lives of those whom he first encountered in Philippi. What would’ve been encouraging or discouraging to you if you were planting a new church. What would your fears be? What would you need to know about God to keep going in your mission? After reading the passage, take some time to answer the Introductory Background Questions

### Bible Reading & Meditation: Acts 16:1-40

**1** Paul came to Derbe and then to Lystra, where a disciple named Timothy lived, whose mother was Jewish and a believer but whose father was a Greek. **2** The believers at Lystra and Iconium spoke well of him. **3** Paul wanted to take him along on the journey, so he circumcised him because of the Jews who lived in that area, for they all knew that his father was a Greek. **4** As they traveled from town to town, they delivered the decisions reached by the apostles and elders in Jerusalem for the people to obey. **5** So the churches were strengthened in the faith and grew daily in numbers.

**6** Paul and his companions traveled throughout the region of Phrygia and Galatia, having been kept by the Holy Spirit from preaching the word in the province of Asia. **7** When they came to the border of Mysia, they tried to enter Bithynia, but the Spirit of Jesus would not

allow them to. **8** So they passed by Mysia and went down to Troas. **9** During the night Paul had a vision of a man of Macedonia standing and begging him, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." **10** After Paul had seen the vision, we got ready at once to leave for Macedonia, concluding that God had called us to preach the gospel to them.

**11** From Troas we put out to sea and sailed straight for Samothrace, and the next day we went on to Neapolis. **12** From there we traveled to Philippi, a Roman colony and the leading city of that district of Macedonia. And we stayed there several days. **13** On the Sabbath we went outside the city gate to the river, where we expected to find a place of prayer. We sat down and began to speak to the women who had gathered there. **14** One of those listening was a woman from the city of Thyatira named Lydia, a dealer in purple cloth. She was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to respond to Paul's message. **15** When she and the members of her household were baptized, she invited us to her home. "If you consider me a believer in the Lord," she said, "come and stay at my house." And she persuaded us.

**16** Once when we were going to the place of prayer, we were met by a female slave who had a spirit by which she predicted the future. She earned a great deal of money for her owners by fortune-telling. **17** She followed Paul and the rest of us, shouting, "These men are servants of the Most High God, who are telling you the way to be saved." **18** She kept this up for many days. Finally Paul became so annoyed that he turned around and said to the spirit, "In the name of Jesus Christ I command you to come out of her!" At that moment the spirit left her.

**19** When her owners realized that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace to face the authorities. **20** They brought them before the magistrates and said, "These men are Jews, and are throwing our city into an uproar **21** by advocating customs unlawful for us Romans to accept or practice."

**22** The crowd joined in the attack against Paul and Silas, and the magistrates ordered them to be stripped and beaten with rods. **23** After they had been severely flogged, they were thrown into prison, and the jailer was commanded to guard them carefully. **24** When he received these orders, he put them in the inner cell and fastened their feet in the stocks. **20** They brought them before the magistrates and said, "These men are Jews, and are throwing our city into an uproar **21** by advocating customs unlawful for us Romans to accept or practice." **22** The crowd joined in the attack against Paul and Silas, and the magistrates ordered them to be stripped and beaten with rods. **23** After they had been severely flogged, they were thrown into prison, and the jailer was commanded to guard them carefully. **24** When he received these orders, he put them in the inner cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

**25** About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. **26** Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that the foundations of the prison were shaken. At once all the prison doors flew open, and everyone's chains came loose. **27** The jailer woke up, and when he saw the prison doors open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself because he thought the prisoners had escaped. **28** But Paul shouted, "Don't harm yourself! We are all here!"

**29** The jailer called for lights, rushed in and fell trembling before Paul and Silas. **30** He then brought them out and asked, “Sirs, what must I do to be saved?”

**31** They replied, “Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved—you and your household.”

**32** Then they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all the others in his house. **33** At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and all his household were baptized. **34** The jailer brought them into his house and set a meal before them; he was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God—he and his whole household.

**35** When it was daylight, the magistrates sent their officers to the jailer with the order: “Release those men.” **36** The jailer told Paul, “The magistrates have ordered that you and Silas be released. Now you can leave. Go in peace.” **37** But Paul said to the officers: “They beat us publicly without a trial, even though we are Roman citizens, and threw us into prison. And now do they want to get rid of us quietly? No! Let them come themselves and escort us out.”

**38** The officers reported this to the magistrates, and when they heard that Paul and Silas were Roman citizens, they were alarmed. **39** They came to appease them and escorted them from the prison, requesting them to leave the city. **40** After Paul and Silas came out of the prison, they went to Lydia’s house, where they met with the brothers and sisters and encouraged them. Then they left.

### **Introductory Background Questions**

- What were 2-3 things that stood out to you about how God was working to start the church in Philippi?
- What were 2-3 things that stood out to you about Paul’s life in Acts 16? Where did he need to be dependent on the Lord? Where would he have needed to walk by faith?
- What one thing do you think the Lord wanted to show you from this passage today?

**Close in Prayer:** “The heart of man plans his way, but the LORD establishes his steps.” As you close in prayer today, where might you need to yield to God in your own life right now? Talk to Jesus about that for a few minutes, and what makes it difficult to do.

#### Acts 15:36-18:22

##### The Gospel in Greece:

Paul's second missionary journey centered on the cities of the Greek provinces of Macedonia and Achaia, including Philippi, Thessalonica, Berea, Athens, and Corinth. This second journey (see map) probably began in A.D. 48 or 49 and ended in 51.
